

Gingerbread Cookies

INGREDIENTS

6 cups all-purpose flour

- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 cup shortening, melted and cooled slightly

- 1 cup molasses
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 egg


Directions

Sift together the flour, baking powder, ginger, nutmeg, cloves, and cinnamon; set aside.

In a medium bowl, mix together the shortening, molasses, brown sugar, water, egg, and vanilla until smooth. Gradually stir in the dry ingredients, until they are completely absorbed. Divide dough into 3 pieces, pat down to 1 1/2 inch thickness, wrap in plastic wrap, and refrigerate for at least 3 hours.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough out to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut into desired shapes with cookie cutters. Place cookies 1 inch apart onto an ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake for 10 to 12 minutes in the preheated oven. When the cookies are done, they will look dry, but still be soft to the touch. Remove from the baking sheet to cool on wire racks. When cool, the cookies can be frosted with the icing of your choice.



December

December is the twelfth and final month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars. It is the seventh and last month to have the length of 31 days.

December got its name from the Latin word decem (meaning ten) because it was originally the tenth month of the year in the Roman calendar, which began in March. The winter days following December were not included as part of any month. Later, the months of January and February were created out of the monthless period and added to the beginning of the calendar, but December retained its name. December contains the winter solstice in the Northern Hemisphere, the day with the fewest daylight hours, and the summer solstice in the Southern Hemisphere, the day with the most daylight hours (excluding polar regions in both cases). December in the Northern Hemisphere is the seasonal equivalent to June in the Southern Hemisphere and vice versa. In the Northern hemisphere, the beginning of the astronomical winter is traditionally 21 December or the date of the solstice. December's birth flower is the narcissus.

December's birthstones are the turquoise, zircon, and tanzanite.

The zodiac signs for the month of December are Sagittarius (until December 21) and Capricorn (December 22 onwards).









First Human heart transplant completed: December 3rd 1967

Lewis Washkansky (53 years old) receives first human heart transplant at Groote Schuur Hospital in Cape Town, South Africa. After Washkansky's surgery, he was given drugs to suppress his immune system and keep his body from rejecting the heart. These drugs also left him susceptible to sickness, however, and 18 days later he died from double pneumonia. Despite the setback, Washkansky's new heart had functioned normally until his death.

Pearl Harbour: December 7th 1941

The attack on pearl harbour happened on December 7th 1941. Japanese airplanes made a surprise attack on the US Navy in Pearl Harbour. The entire attacked lasted around 110minutes, just under two hours. President Roosevelt gave a famous speech after the attack in which he said December 7ths would be a 'Day which would live in infamy'.

John Lennon Died: December 8th 1980

It was almost 11pm when Lennon's Limousine reappeared outside the Dakota building. Almost as soon as the musician got out, he glanced towards the shadows, perhaps recognizing the man he had seen earlier, and at that moment, Chapman opened fire. The first bullet missed; the next four all hit their target.

Mario Lemeuix returns to NHL: December 27th 2000








Origin of Christmas

The origins of Christmas can be traced all the way back to ancient pagan celebrations such as Deus Sol Invictus (December 25th), The Kalends (January 1st-5th) and Saturnalia (December 17th-23rd) The Christian Church approved of these celebrations and declared the 25th as Jesus' Birthday, thus co-opting the holidays.

Mistletoe was sacred to the Norse, Celtic Druids and Native's as it remained green and continues to produce fruit during the winter when other plants die. The Celtic Druids thought the plant had the power to cure infertility and nervous diseases, also to ward off evil.

Long before Christmas Trees, Evergreens were the Pagan symbol of eternal life and rebirth.

According to old English folk tales, the Devil died when Jesus was born. Some towns developed a tradition of ringing the church bells near midnight on Christmas Eve to announce the Devil's death. In England this custom was called tolling or ringing "the Devil's knell."

Origin of Hanukkah

"The eight-day Jewish celebration known as Hanukkah or Chanukah commemorates the rededication during the second century B.C. of the Second Temple in Jerusalem, where according to legend Jews had risen up against their Greek-Syrian oppressors in the Maccabean Revolt. Hanukkah, which means "dedication" in Hebrew, begins on the 25th of Kislev on the Hebrew calendar and usually falls in November or December. Often called the Festival of Lights, the holiday is celebrated with the lighting of the menorah, traditional foods, games and aifts."

Origin of Kwanzaa

"The name Kwanzaa is derived from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means "first fruits" in Swahili. Each family celebrates Kwanzaa in its own way, but celebrations often include songs and dances, African drums, storytelling, poetry reading, and a large traditional meal. On each of the seven nights, the family gathers and a child lights one of the candles on the Kinara (candleholder), then one of the seven principles is discussed. The principles, called the Nguzo Saba (seven principles in Swahili) are values of African culture which contribute to building and reinforcing community among African-Americans. Kwanzaa also has seven basic symbols which represent values and concepts reflective of African culture. An African feast, called a Karamu, is held on December 31. The candle-lighting ceremony each evening provides the opportunity to gather and discuss the meaning of Kwanzaa. The first night, the black candle in the center is lit (and the principle of umoja/unity is discussed). One candle is lit each evening and the appropriate principle is discussed."
